### **Premises Licence Review Hearing**

## **Purpose of report**

To consider a request from Oxfordshire Trading Standards (OTS) for a review of the premises licence relating to:

Banbury Express Food and Wine, 179 Warwick Road, Banbury, OX16 1AS.

### 1.0 Recommendations

1.1 There are no recommendations, but in considering the representations received and what is appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, the steps the Sub-Committee can take are outlined in paragraph 6.2.

### 2.0 Introduction

2.1 To consider an application to review a premises licence submitted by OTS.

## 3.0 Report Details

- 3.1 Banbury Express Food and Wine is a small convenience store on the Warwick Road in Banbury. The store currently benefits from a premises licence ("the Licence") issued in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 ("the Act"), covering the off sale of alcohol by retail.
- 3.2 A premises licence is granted once the applicant has satisfied the licensing authority that their proposed business will meet all of the licensing objectives, as prescribed in the Act.

For the promotion of the licensing objectives, mandatory conditions are attached on all premises licences, and premises' may also propose conditions to their licence which demonstrate their ability for their business to meet the requirements under the Act.

A copy of the Licence, listing the licensing conditions, is attached to this report as appendix 1.

- 3.3 Any sale of alcohol must be authorised by a person who holds a personal licence issued under the Act, and every premises selling in these circumstances must have a designated premises supervisor (DPS) in place. This is a person holding a personal licence who is ultimately responsible for all alcohol sales.
- 3.4 The premises licence was first granted on 31 August 2016 and was transferred to a private limited company on 3 September 2019 having received an application from Mr Narinder Singh Malhotra. Mr Malhotra is listed on companies house as the sole Director of the limited company.
- 3.5 On the 17<sup>th</sup> September 2019 Cherwell District Council Licensing Department received an application from OTS requesting a review of the Licence. The grounds for the review were based on the Licensing objectives in relation to Crime and Disorder and Protection of children from harm.

A copy of the licence review application submitted by OTS is attached to this report as appendix 2; the details of which will be presented to the committee by the review applicant.

### 4.0 Consultation

- 4.1 When an application to review a premises licence is received the licensing authority must display a notice at or near the relevant premises, at the council offices and on the council's website. The consultation period runs for 28 days from the day after the application is received. This gives interested parties and responsible authorities the opportunity to make representations in relation to the application. Full compliance requirements have been met in respect of this review.
- 4.2 Representations have been received from the following responsible Licensing authorities: Thames Valley Police, Cherwell District Council and Oxfordshire Public Health, details of which are attached to this report as appendix 3, 4 and 5. Under section 13(4) of the Act the Licensing Authority may submit representations as one of the responsible authorities.
- 4.3 Environmental Health, Planning, Health Protection and Compliance and the Secretary of State responded with 'no objections" or "no comments" to make'. No response was received from:
  - Oxfordshire Fire and Rescue Service
  - Oxfordshire Safeguarding Children's Board
- 4.4 All information and evidence from the License holder, interested parties, and responsible Authorities will be presented to the committee by the respective representative present.

### 5.0 Conclusion and Reasons for Recommendations

5.1 There is no recommendation.

## 6.0 Alternative Options and Reasons for Rejection

- 6.1 At the end of the consultation period the licensing authority must hold a hearing. It must take such steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, which are:
  - the prevention of crime and disorder

  - the protection of children from harm
- 6.2 The steps the Sub-Committee can take are to:
  - take no action:
  - modify the conditions of the Licence;
  - · remove the designated premises supervisor;
  - exclude a licensable activity from the Licence;
  - suspend the licence for a period not exceeding 3 months;
  - revoke the licence.

## **Annex 1 – Mandatory conditions**

All Premises Licence authorising supply of alcohol

The licence is granted subject to the Mandatory conditions for sale of alcohol as set out in the Licensing Act 2003 as amended by the Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Licensing Conditions) Order 2010 and Order 2014.

- 1. No Supply of alcohol may be made under the Premises Licence -
- a) At a time when there is no Designated Premises Supervisor in respect of the Premises Licence; or
- b) At a time when then the Designated Premises Supervisor does not hold a Personal Licence or his Personal Licence is suspended
- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the Premises Licence must be made, or authorised by a person who holds a Personal Licence
- 3.1 The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises
- 3.2 In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises.
- a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to -
- i. drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
- ii. drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
- e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
- 4. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available
- 5.1 The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licences must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- 5.3 The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either:-
- a. a holographic mark or
- b. an ultraviolet feature
- 6. The responsible person must ensure that -
- a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures:-
- i. beer or cider: ½ pint;
- ii. gin, rum, vodka or whiskey: 25ml or 35ml; and
- iii. still wine in a glass: 125ml; and
- b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

### **Minimum Drinks Pricing**

- 1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price
- For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1 -
- a. "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979
- b. "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

### P=D+(DxV)

### Where: -

- i. P is the permitted price
- ii. D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of alcohol, and
- iii. V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of alcohol;
- c. "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
- i. The holder of the premises licence
- ii. The designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- iii. The personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- d. "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- e. "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with Value Added Tax Act 1994
- 3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from the paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 4.1 Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax
- 4.2 The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day

	1. On 16 <sup>th</sup> December 2018, Oxfordshire County Council Trading Standards conducted a covert test purchase visit at Banbury Express and purchased 20 illegal smuggled cigarettes for £6.50. The purchaser was not asked their age or for proof of age.
	2. On 3 <sup>rd</sup> March 2019, Oxfordshire County Council Trading Standards conducted a covert test purchase visit at Banbury Express and purchased 20 illegal smuggled cigarettes for £6.50. The purchaser was not asked their age or for proof of age.
	3. On 9 <sup>th</sup> June 2019, Oxfordshire County Council Trading Standards conducted an announced enforcement visit at Banbury Express. 300 illegal smuggled cigarettes were identified in a chocolate bar box behind the till point and seized. 2540 illegal smuggled cigarettes were also identified within two boxes in the shop storeroom and
	seized. A further single packet of illegal smuggled hand-rolling tobacco was identified in an additional storeroom and seized.
	4. Breaches of licence conditions have been detected during the course of investigations into the above matters.
	5. The premises licence holder / designated premises supervisor has been complicit in the unlawful conduct.

Please provide as much information as possible to support the application (please read guidance note 2)

- 1. This review is being brought due to evidence that the licensed premises Banbury Express has been used to sell and store illegal tobacco. Further, this submission will show that this activity has been ongoing for a significant amount of time and an aggravating factor is that Mr Narinder Singh Malhotra, the owner and sole director of the Company that owns and runs the shop, has been directly involved in the criminality. Mr Malhotra is also now the premises licence holder and designated premises supervisor.
- 2. Banbury Express was granted its premises licence on 31 August 2016. The premises licence was granted to Mr Gurmeet Singh who also was appointed as the designated premises supervisor at this time.
- 3. However, the business itself is operated by Banbury Express Food and Wine Ltd and its director Mr Malhotra. Mr Singh is Mr Malhotra's brother-in-law. Mr Malhotra is a personal licence holder and, at the time of this submission, is also the premises licence holder and designated premises supervisor of another convenience store in Wokingham, albeit a business he does not own or work in.
- 4. On 4<sup>th</sup> October 2018, Trading Standards received intelligence alleging that Banbury Express was selling illegal tobacco. The intelligence alleged that "the shopkeeper/assistant goes through into the back of the shop to get it".
- 5. After receiving judicial authorisation from Oxford Magistrates' Court, on 16<sup>th</sup> December 2018, 1 x 20 Marlboro Gold cigarettes were retrieved from under the counter and sold for £6.50 at Banbury Express to a covert operative working on behalf of Trading Standards. The cigarettes were labelled in a foreign language, do not comply with standardised plain packaging requirements and are non-UK duty paid. The purchaser was not asked their age or for proof of age. The seller was described as an Asian male, aged in his 30s, with a black beard and wearing a patka.
- 6. After receiving further judicial authorisation from Oxford Magistrates' Court, on 3<sup>rd</sup> March 2019, 1 x 20 Marlboro Gold cigarettes were retrieved from under the counter and sold for £6.50 at Banbury Express to a covert surveillance operative working on behalf of Trading Standards. The cigarettes were labelled in a foreign language, do not comply with standardised plain packaging requirements and are non-UK duty paid. The purchaser was not asked their age or for proof of age. The seller was described as an Asian male but was not the same Asian male that sold on the earlier occasion.
- 7. On 9<sup>th</sup> June 2019, officers from Oxfordshire Trading Standards conducted an announced visit at Banbury Express in order to inspect the premises for tobacco products. A white male, who identified himself as "redacted person A", was the sole person present in the premises. A short time later, Narinder Singh Malhotra arrived at the premises.
- 8. Mr Malhortra was asked, other than the legitimate tobacco products in the gantry, were there any other tobacco products in the premises. He directed officers to a box of (legal) cigarettes in a box in a rear storeroom. He did not indicate any other storage of tobacco products in the premises. The inspection then commenced and shortly afterwards smuggled and suspected counterfeit cigarettes were identified concealed in a "Snickers box" on a shelf in the counter area. Mr Malhotra made the unsolicited comment that he had bought them from a Polish guy the day before. The search continued and further smuggled and suspected counterfeit cigarettes were

identified in two boxed within the main storeroom.

9. The following items were subsequently seized:

From counter area: 3 x 20 Marlboro Red 10 x 20 Marlboro Gold 2 x 20 L&M Blue

From rear storeroom: 47 x 20 Marlboro Gold 33 x 20 L&M Blue 23 x 20 Vogue LA 6 x 20 Vogue Clic 10 x 20 LD Green 8 x 20 Marlboro Red

A total seizure of 2840 illegal cigarettes. The Marlboro Red cigarettes appeared to be counterfeit as each packet was marked with an identical code whereas each packet should have a unique code.

- 10. In order to obtain evidence of the person who had allegedly supplied the illegal cigarettes the day before the seizure, the CCTV was requested. However Mr Malhotra was unable to get the system to work at the time of the request.
- 11. Subsequent enquiries determined that, at the material time, the then premises licence holder and designated premises supervisor, Mr Gurmeet Singh, did not work at the shop, had no financial involvement in the shop, had not met "person A" and runs a Vape shop in Birmingham. He had not had any involvement with the business for over a year.
- 12. Mr Malhotra was interviewed under caution on 26<sup>th</sup> July 2019. He was asked what he understood the law to be in relation to selling smuggling or counterfeit tobacco from a shop and answered "It means I should not be selling counterfeits because they are not duty paid" and subsequently added "If the police catches me then I am in trouble".
- 13. Initially he said that he had bought some of the seized cigarettes from a Polish man on 8<sup>th</sup> June, the day before the seizure. He explained that the Polish man had approached him around 2 and a half months previously and he had bought illegal cigarettes from him on 3 or 4 occasions. Mr Malhotra said that he had first purchased illegal cigarettes from the Polish man at the start of April 2019. He was asked how sure he was of this and he replied "I'm sure, sir, 'cause obviously if I buy something then I should be sure".
- 14. Mr Malhotra initially said that it was only him who sold the illegal cigarettes and not any of his staff. He sold between 30-40 packets of illegal cigarettes per week. He said he only sold them to 4 or 5 regular Polish customers. He was asked how sure he was that he had only sold to these 4 or 5 customers and he answered that he was sure as they were his regular customers and he knew them personally.
- 15. The test purchase of illegal cigarettes which was made on 3<sup>rd</sup> March 2019 was then disclosed to Mr Malhotra. When challenged that he had previously said that he had purchased the illegal cigarettes for the first time from the Polish man in early April, he adjusted his answer to say that it could have been March. He then said he hadn't purchased any illegal cigarettes before March.

- 16. Mr Malhotra was shown an image of the physical seller on 3<sup>rd</sup> March taken from the covert camera which recorded the transaction. The seller was neither Mr Malhotra or person A.
- 17. Mr Malhotra explained that this person was a customer who had happened to be in the shop one day when he needed to go to London to the cash and carry. He said he was a Pakistani-Asian and he only knew him by his nickname of "Sam". He did not know his surname or have a contact number for him. He no longer frequented the shop.
- 18. When asked what training he had given "Sam" on age-restricted sales, Mr Malhotra said "I told him like the person looks under 25 or 21, he must ask for the ID and stuff. Even the system, the EPOS till does tell you as well that you must check for the ID and anything you must sell over 18". However, the test purchaser was aged 21 and was not asked their age or for proof of age.
- 19. Mr Malhotra could not explain how "Sam" came to know that illegal tobacco was sold at the premises, where it was stored or the price it was sold for.
- 20. Mr Malhotra was then asked if he wanted to think again about any of the answers he had given so far. He answered "I think I stick to my answers, sir".
- 21. The test purchase from 16<sup>th</sup> December 2018 was then disclosed to Mr Malhotra. He stated "It can't be true to be honest. 2018, can't be true. Can't be true. I know you said you did it but it can't be true" and "We didn't have any in 2018".
- 22. Mr Malhotra was shown the covert footage from the test purchase and identified himself as the physical seller. He adjusted his earlier statements and stated that "maybe it was October or November something like that" in respect of when the shop started selling illegal cigarettes.
- 23. He said he was now "100% sure" that he had started buying them in October or November and had bought them every 2-3 weeks. He explained that he said April 2019 initially "Because I got really scared, to be honest"
- 24. The evidence contradicts Mr Malhotra's account that the shop followed a Challenge 25 policy and that the illegal cigarettes were only sold to 4-5 Polish customers he knew personally. The two test purchasers were aged 21 and 22 respectively at the time of the sales, neither are Polish and neither had been in the shop before. Mr Malhotra apologised saying "It's a big mistake. It can never happen again sir. I apologise for that. Sorry. To be honest I say, I say, if they look like Polish or something" and added "It's a big mistake, I agree with my mistake, it can never happen again sir. I apologise for that sir".
- 25. It was put to Mr Malhotra that he had consistently lied during the interview and he replied "To be honest, you are right. I agree with you". He later added "All I can say is that I am so sorry for what I did. I made a mistake and it will never happen again".
- 26. The premises licence currently includes the following conditions within its operating schedule:
- strict implementation of Challenge 25
- on (sic) staff at all times will have knowledge how to operate the CCTV and download images if needed

- All staff to be trained in responsible alcohol retailing
- All stock to be bought from reputable Cash & Carry / Wholesalers
- All alcohol and tobacco products will be purchased from established and bona fide VAT registered traders.
- 27. As has been explained, there is prima facie evidence to indicate that these conditions have been breached.
- 28. The revised statutory guidance provides some assistance in determing the seriousness of the sale and storage of illegal tobacco in licensed premises.

### At para 11.26 it states:

"The licensing authority's duty is to take steps with a view to the promotion of the licensing objectives and the prevention of illegal working in the interests of the wider community and not those of the individual licence holder"

### At para 11.27 it states:

"There is certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously. These are the use of the licensed premises (and includes):

- for the sale or storage of smuggled tobacco and alcohol

### And at para 11.28 it states that:

"Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence - even in the first instance - should be seriously considered."

- 29. In R (Bassetlaw District Council) v Worksop Magistrates' Court (2008) EWHC 3530, MJ Slade found on the application for review of a premises licence in circumstances involving criminal conduct connect with licensed premises, consideration must be given to what was necessary to promote the objective of crime prevention, and to the needs of the wider community, and not to be limited to guidance and remedial action and to the needs of the licence-holders. Deterrence is an appropriate consideration when the paragraphs specifically directed to dealing with reviews where there has been activity in connection with crime are applicable.
- 30. The evidence shows that Mr Malhotra, the sole director of the Company and now the premises licence holder and designated premises supervisor, has been directly involved in alleged criminal conduct. The evidence also shows that he has lied when given the opportunity to do so. Existing conditions have been wilfully ignored over an extended period. The Trading Standards Service regards these as aggravating factors of particular concern. Given the statutory guidance and supporting precedent, it is the recommendation of this Service that the premises licence be revoked.
- 31. If revocation is strongly considered but not deemed appropriate, it is recommended that a period of suspension with appropriate conditions would act as a necessary deterrent to promote the crime prevention objective and to protect the needs of the wider community including law-abiding businesses as well as adults and young people. Those conditions to amend/replace any similar existing conditions as

### follows:

- 1. Tobacco Products
- 1.1 All staff who are authorised to buy tobacco products must take all reasonable precautions and exercise due diligence in order to avoid buying illegal goods. This will include but not limited to the following:
- a) All authorised staff responsible for the purchase of tobacco products shall not purchase any goods from door-to-door sellers other than from established traders who provide full receipts at the time of the delivery
- b) The authorised buyers shall ensure that all receipts for tobacco products bought include the following details:
- i. Seller's name and address
- ii. Seller's company details, if applicable
- iii. Seller's VAT details, if applicable
- iv. Seller's vehicle registration details, if applicable
- 1.2 Legible copies of invoices/receipts shall be retained on the premises and made available for inspection by Police or Trading Standards on request.
- 1.3 Where anyone working within the premises becomes aware that any non-duty tobacco may have been offered for purchase, they shall inform the Police or Trading Standards immediately and keep a written record of such action.
- 1.4 Smuggled or counterfeit tobacco products for personal use must not be stored on the premises.

### 2 Signage

A3 Illegal Tobacco Keep It Out posters including the illegal tobacco hotline reporting number shall be displayed prominently at the entrance and sales area of the licensed premises at all times.

### 3 Challenge 25

The premises shall operate in accordance with the "Challenge 25" scheme. This scheme operates on the basis that whilst alcohol or tobacco may be sold to persons aged 18 years and over, anyone who appears under 25 years of age will be asked for proof of age. Notices to this effect shall be displayed in a clear and prominent position at the entrance to the premises and at the point of sale.

### 3. Refusals Book

A refusals book shall be kept at the premises in which must be recorded forthwith the date, time and circumstances under which any attempted purchase of alcohol or tobacco by a customer has been refused. This book must be made available for inspection by any duly authorised officer of trading standards or licensing (including Police licensing) upon request.

4. All staff working at the premises (whether paid or unpaid) who sell alcohol or tobacco shall receive training in the responsible retail of alcohol/tobacco and this training will be repeated on at least an annual basis. The premises licence holder will consult with trading standards and the Police regarding the nature of that training. Such training shall be recorded and these records shall be made available upon the request of a duly authorised officer of trading standards or licensing (including Police licensing).

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

My colleague has drawn my attention to the fact that Mr Malhotra was effectively interviewed a second time as he was also interviewed as representative of the limited company.

Within that second interview the following is discussed:

DB: So can you give me an explanation from the company about those seizures? NSM: Seizures. As in the company shouldn't really be selling these products that is not UK duty paid. So

DB: What precautions does the company take to ensure that illegal tobacco is not sold from the premises?

NSM: Basically, only buying from the supplier that is VAT registered. So, we shouldn't really be selling the illegal tobacco or cigarettes in the shop

DB: And does the company understand that having those products on the premises does not comply with the licensing rule and the licence it holds?

NSM: Yes it does know. It's not allowed to sell these under the premises licence as well.

DB: So, if the company understands that, can you just explain to me briefly why those products were purchased.

NSM: As a few customers asked for me so that's why I got from one person and I just made a very big mistake to be honest. We shouldn't really be selling this. It's not duty paid tobacco and cigarettes.

I believe this is relevant and should be included in the review. I don't think it can be dealt with by amplification of my the original application and so should be considered as supporting information in accordance with Regulation 18 of The Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

## <u>Subject: Trading Standards Review of Banbury Express Food & Wine (179 Warwick Road, Banbury), Licence Number: PRM0712</u>

Having been made aware of the recent application by Oxfordshire Trading Standards to review the premises licence for Banbury Express, Thames Valley Police as a named responsible authority under the Licensing Act 2003 wish to submit a representation in support of Trading Standards.

Whilst our evidenced concerns at this time are not as extensive as that of Trading Standards the premises does pose some concerns which we believe the Subcommittee should also take into consideration when deciding on the matter.

From 2018 the premises has been the subject of a handful of intelligence reports suggesting that young persons of the local area attend the premises because it is known to sell both cigarettes and alcohol to children.

From these intelligence reports Thames Valley Police conducted an underage alcohol test purchase operation on the 26th of January 2018. The premises failed and a member of staff was witnessed by plain clothes police officers to sell a bottle of wine to the volunteer children aged 15 and 16 years without challenging for proof of age or refusing the sale outright. As this member of staff had no previous convictions for this offence, had stated to officers this was their first shift and they had received no training on the legal requirements to sell alcohol the officer's decision was to give words of advice.

However as is the overarching process with regard to the matter of the premises licence which runs concurrent with the criminal offence on the night against the individual member of staff, a meeting was held with the premises on the 19<sup>th</sup> of February 2018 to discuss this failure and afford the premises the opportunity to put steps in place to mitigate future underage sale.

The meeting also sought to discuss a number of issues regarding compliance with some of the conditions of the grant contained in annex 2 that were also noted on the evening of the test purchase failure when the officers re-entered the store.

Whilst this was under the tenure of Gurmeet Singh who was the previous named premises licence holder and designated premise supervisor, Trading Standards state there is a family connection between Gurmeet Singh and the current designated premise supervisor Narinder Malhotra (and director of Banbury Express Food & Wine Ltd- the premises licence holder). Further a search on the Companies House public access portal establishes Narinder Malhotra's involvement with the premises prior to his nomination on the licence. As such Narinder Malhotra has been in a position of responsibility regarding the operation of the licence for a number of years. Therefore the alcohol test purchase failure and other matters in 2018 are relevant to the matter at hand.

Since the test purchase failure we have received the intelligence reports from Trading Standards from 2018 and 2019 and one report from the public to the police station in Banbury detailing an allegation of further underage sales (enclosed).

The review report submitted by Trading Standards is very concerning. The police have found that where there is an issue with one age restricted product there are likely to be similar issues with another.

All of this calls into question the management of the premises and its ability to promote the licensing objectives.

Given the seriousness of the offences evidenced by Trading Standards they are calling for revocation of the licence.

However Trading Standards go on to state that if the sub-committee were minded not to revoke, they outline a number of appropriate conditions they believe will help mitigate this matter, and ensure the promotion of the four licensing objectives.

Thames Valley Police also request that if the Sub-committee decide not to revoke the premises licence, they please consider one further condition with the raft put forward by Trading Standards.

This condition relates to the provision of CCTV. This would ensure there is a suitable system in place to help both with the evidence gathering process should there be further offences as those referred to in this review, but also to help the premises in deterring antisocial behaviour and crime that is often linked with underage sales.

### This condition is:

A CCTV system will be installed and maintained. The CCTV system will incorporate the following basic requirements:

- Be switched on and fully operational when the licensable activities are being carried out.
- Record for a minimum rolling period of 31 days
- Have a camera covering any entrance which will provide a facial shot of identification quality.

- Have cameras covering any pertinent public areas (internally and externally) to the shop including areas where alcohol and tobacco are merchandised as well as the point of sale
- Have clear and prominent signage at all entrance, exits and pertinent locations within the shop including areas where alcohol and tobacco are merchandised advising customers that there is a CCTV system in operation
- Have a means of copying any footage to another medium as evidence if requested by the Police, Licensing Authority and/or Trading Standards.
- Have a member of staff working at all times whilst the licence is in operation that is able to operate the system and in particular be able to provide copies of any footage requested by The Police, Licensing Authority and/or Trading Standards.

A system shall be in place to maintain the quality of the recorded image and a complete audit trail maintained. The system will comply with other essential legislation, and all signs as required will be clearly displayed.

If the sub-committee does agree to the inclusion of the above, we suggest that reference to CCTV already on the existing licencing will need to be removed to avoid confusion or repetition, namely:

'staff at all times will have knowledge how to operate the CCTV and download images if needed CCTV to be installed and 31 days recording system CCTV working at all times

Posters to be displayed to show CCTV monitoring anti-social behaviour'

# Banbury Express food & wine, Warwick rd Premises Licence Number 0712

On the evening of 26<sup>th</sup> January 2018, a Test Purchasing Operation was carried out by Thames Valley Police, in Banbury.

Unfortunately your premises failed the test, and alcohol was served to two females, aged fifteen and sixteen years. 1 Bottle of Rose wine was sold by a member of staff.

It is an offence under the Licensing Act 2003, sections 146-147, to sell or allow the sale of alcohol to anyone under the age of eighteen years. The penalty for this can be up to £5000 fine.

The offence committed on the evening of 26<sup>th</sup> January was dealt with via a warning to the person who made the sale as it was their first day and they had not had any training. At this time, the Police will not seek a prosecution against the Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS), Gurmeet Singh. However, the Licensing Authority at Cherwell District Council will be informed of the offence.

As this is the first occasion that the premises have failed a Test Purchase, it can now be seen that this is an initial warning, and that any future failures will be met with a more robust response. This will in the form of an Application to Review the License and/or a prosecution under the Licensing Act 2003.

Due to a number of issues noted with compliance of your licence on the evening in question a meeting is to be held with yourself at your premise at 11.00 on Tuesday 13<sup>th</sup> February 2018. If there are any issues with this time or date please contact myself ion the above numbers.

# Cherwell District Council representation as a Responsible Authority regarding the licence review of:

# Banbury Express Food and Wine, 179 Warwick Road, Banbury, OX16 1AS

I am Christine Pegler, Lead Licensing Enforcement Officer employed by Cherwell District Council within the Environmental Health and Licensing Directorate. As part of my role I am responsible for the Licensing of premises, and have delegated powers, under the Licensing Act 2003.

For the purpose of this licensing review I am representing Cherwell District Council as a responsible Authority, acting independently to other Cherwell District Council Licensing Officers facilitating this licensing review.

1. On 10/06/2019 I received intelligence regarding the Licensed premises of Banbury Express Food and Wine, 179 Warwick Road, Banbury, OX16 1AS, Premises licence number PRM0712.

This intelligence was from Oxfordshire Trading Standards and suggested that the premises were selling illegal tobacco products at the premises, along with other illegal goods. I exhibit this intelligence as **APPENDIX 1**.

One of the licensed premises conditions is that all stock would be purchased from a reputable, VAT registered source, and as such the premises may have breached their licensing conditions and failed to adhere to the licensing objectives.

- 2. As a result of this intelligence, on 21/06/2019 I inspected the licensed premises. Whilst there I spoke to Mr Narinder Singh who was at that time the premises designated premises supervisor (DPS), and the following further conditions of licence were established as having been breached:
- Any staff training, which may have taken place, had not been recorded or evidenced in a training manual.
- The Fire Exits sign were missing.
- Not all staff were trained to use the shops CCTV system, and therefor would be unable to provide footage if requested by an authorised officer.

I exhibit a copy of this premise's inspection as APPENDIX 2.

- 3. As a result of the said breaches of the conditions of the premises licence the licence holder was issued with a formal warning and requested to rectify all the listed breaches of licence. This letter was dated 11/07/2019. I exhibit a copy of this warning letter as APPENDIX 3.
- 4. On 30/09/2019 I inspected the said premises again. Whilst there I spoke to Mr J Crawford. Mr Crawford stated that he had not been trained to use the CCTV and did not have access to it. He had a small amount of training when he was first employed, about 8 weeks ago, but he did not see a training manual, or sign any training records.

I exhibit this licensed premises inspection as APPENDIX 4.

5. I have noted that 20/08/2019 the licensing Authority received an application to change the name of the premises licence holder from Mr Narinder Singh to Banbury Express Food and Wine Ltd.

It should be noted the application form to make this change to the premises licence were dated 13/08/2019 but were not received by the Licensing Authority until 20/08/2019.

I exhibit the application form to vary the premises licence as **APPENDIX 5**.

- 6. Having checked Banbury Food and wine Ltd on Companies House, Mr Narinder Singh is the sole director of that company. I exhibit a copy of my Companies House search as **APPENDIX 6**.
- 7. I would like to draw attention to the following:

### Home Office Revised Guidance under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003

- 1.9 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. This Guidance is therefore binding on all licensing authorities to that extent.
- 2.5 Conditions relating to the management competency of designated premises supervisors should not normally be attached to premises licences. It will normally be the responsibility of the premises licence holder as an employer, and not the licensing authority, to ensure that the managers appointed at the premises are competent and appropriately trained. The designated premises supervisor is the key person who will usually be responsible for the day to day management of the premises by the premises licence holder, including the prevention of disorder. A condition of this kind may only be justified as appropriate in rare circumstances where it can be demonstrated that, in the circumstances associated with particular premises, poor management competency could give rise to issues of crime and disorder and public safety.
- 11.22 Equally, it may emerge that poor management is a direct reflection of poor company practice or policy and the mere removal of the designated premises supervisor may be an inadequate response to the problems presented. Indeed, where subsequent review hearings are generated by representations, it should be rare merely to remove a succession of designated premises supervisors as this would be a clear indication of deeper problems that impact upon the licensing objectives.
- 11.23 Licensing authorities should also note that modifications of conditions and exclusions of licensable activities may be imposed either permanently or for a temporary period of up to three months. Temporary changes or suspension of the licence for up to three months could impact on the business holding the licence financially and would only be expected to be pursued as an appropriate means of promoting the licensing objectives or preventing illegal working. So, for instance, a licence could be suspended for a weekend as a means of deterring the holder from allowing the problems that gave rise to the review to happen again. However, it will always be important that any detrimental financial impact that may result from a licensing authority's decision is appropriate and proportionate to the promotion of the licensing objectives and for the prevention of illegal working in licensed premises. But where premises are found to be trading irresponsibly, the licensing authority should not hesitate, where appropriate to do so, to take tough action to tackle the problems at the premises and, where other measures are deemed insufficient, to revoke the licence.
- 11.27 There is certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously. These are the use of the licensed premises:

for the sale and distribution of drugs controlled under the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971 and the laundering of the proceeds of drugs crime;

for the sale or storage of smuggled tobacco and alcohol.

11.28 It is envisaged that licensing authorities, the police and other law enforcement agencies, which are responsible authorities, will use the review procedures effectively to deter such activities and crime. Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence – even in the first instance – should be seriously considered.

In light of the specified guidance, and when considering the information presented, it appears that Mr Singh is solely responsible for the running of this business, and the premises licence.

Mr Singh was allowed adequate time following my licensed premises inspection to correct all the outlined breaches of licence, and he had failed to rectify these condition breaches.

Mr Singh appears to be either unable or unwilling to adhere to the Licensing objectives, and the conditions attached to this licence.

This evidence questions if the licensed premises would ever be legally compliant under the requirements of the 2003 Licensing Act, and further questions whether Mr Singh is fit, proper, and suitable to retain such a licence.

Based on the evidence put before you Cherwell District Council Licensing, acting under the requirements of a Responsible Authority, requests that the members consider the revocation of this premises licence.

#### Re: Banbury Express Food and Wine Licence Review

This representation is made on behalf of the Director for Public Health, Oxfordshire County Council in his role as a responsible authority under the Licensing Act 2003, in support of the representation made by Trading Standards, Oxfordshire County Council's application to review the above premises licence on the following grounds:

- 1. The prevention of crime and disorder
- 2. The protection of children from harm

The premises have been storing and selling cigarette packages which were not labelled in English as required by Regulation 11(4) a and thereby constitute offences under Regulation 48 (a)(i).

Additionally, the cigarettes were not UK Duty Paid, and it is an offence under Section 144 (1) of the Licensing Act of 2003 to keep smuggled goods on licensed premises.

Revised Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 (April 2018) 11.27 states:

There is certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously. These are the use of the licensed premises:

• For the sale or storage of smuggled tobacco and alcohol

11.28 "It is envisaged that licensing authorities, the police, the Home Office (Immigration Enforcement) and other law enforcement agencies, which are responsible authorities, will use the review procedures effectively to deter such activities and crime. Where reviews arise and the licensing authorities determines that the crime prevention objectives are being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence -even in the first instance -should be seriously considered."

Public Health data and policy is clear on the dangers of tobacco, and the Department for Health has produced a Tobacco Control Plan in the report 'Towards a Smoke Free Generation' which sets out actions which include

- Ensure the effective operation of legislation such as proxy purchasing, and standardised packaging designed to reduce the uptake of smoking by young people
- Maintain high duty rates for tobacco products to make tobacco less affordable

All the cigarettes that were seized from the site did not comply with standardised plain packaging requirements and were not marked "UK Duty Paid". This has the consequence of making tobacco more affordable which reduces the impact of policies designed to reduce the health harms of tobacco, therefore undermining both tax and public health policy. These illicit whites are regulated much less in their country of origins and have the potential to be more dangerous than tobacco produced to the standards required by UK law, both because of their contents and the potential increased risk of them causing domestic fires. Standardised packaging also has international support from the World Health Organisation as part of their Framework for Tobacco Control, and illicit tobacco undermines this work.

The easy availability of illegal tobacco at reduced cost results in residents, including young people purchasing and smoking more cigarettes /day as well as undermines the efforts of those who are trying to quit. Maintaining high duty rates on tobacco is a proven and effective means through which to reduce smoking, both by providing an incentive to quit, and a disincentive for young people to begin smoking in the first place.

The cost of smoking to society is huge. Smoking causes 79,000 preventable deaths in England and is estimated to cost our economy in excess of £11 billion per year. Treating smoking related diseases cost the NHS more than £2.5 billion each year. In Oxfordshire, smoking costs society approximately £136.9 million. There are 852 early deaths due to smoking in Oxfordshire, totalling 1201 years of lost economic activity.

JSNA, 2019 states that smoking is the leading cause of preventable ill health and premature mortality in the UK, with about half of all life long smokers dying prematurely, losing an average about 10 years of their life. It is also a major risk factor for many diseases, such as lung cancer, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), heart disease and many cancers. Some areas in Banbury are significantly worse than England on most/ all health indicators.

Smoking prevalence is more concentrated among more disadvantaged communities. There are several areas in Banbury which rank amongst the 20% most deprived in the country (IMD, 2019). 22.6% of the current smokers in Cherwell are in routine and manual occupation, even though the smoking prevalence in this category is decreasing. Smokers from lower socio-economic groups face greater barriers to quit smoking, experience higher levels of addiction and increased stress related to material hardship. (Hiscock R et al, 2015). This further exacerbates health inequalities by increasing the likelihood of experiencing smoking -related death and disease. Cheap illegal tobacco fuels teen smoking and is linked to wider organised crime (ASH, 2019).

For these wide- ranging reasons, we would strongly support this review.
